LUCKY DUCKS: NEIGHBORHOOD WOMEN KEEP WATCH OVER ABANDONED FOWL

One morning in the 1980s, Holly Hills resident Helen Stader was driving through Carondelet Park on her way to work and decided to stop to talk to a woman she would often see feeding the ducks at Horseshoe Lake.

Stader learned the woman, who has since moved out of state, started a Pekin Duck Fund. The woman and other volunteers fed, cared for

and, when necessary, rescued the domesticated white Pekin ducks that were abandoned in the park. And from that encounter the Carondelet Branch was born.

The Canada geese, mallards and wood ducks in Carondelet Park are all migratory. But the white Pekin ducks are left behind each winter.



in the neighborhood for 25 years, loves the neighborhood.







TASKFORCE HELPS PREVENT IDENTITY THEFT

As many as 10 million Americans have their identities stolen annually. With more people using the internet for shopping, banking, and other secure transactions, the opportunity for fraud has increased. The Circuit Attorney's Office has a Fraud Prevention Taskforce aimed at helping St. Louis citizens protect themselves against fraud, identity theft, and scams, The Fraud Prevention Taskforce, which was founded in 2007, is led by 36-year St. Louis Police Department veteran Jack Huelsmann.

Taskforce provides information and seminars to the public on a variety of subjects. One popular subject is Mail and Internet Fraud, which accounts for 20-30% of all scams committed in the US. A seminar on Senior Fraud gives seniors and their loved ones tools to protect themselves. When the economy is slow, people can become targets of Employment and Job Search Fraud. This seminar provides tips on how to search for jobs safely online and avoid





"The Pekin duck can fly but usually does not," said Michael Macek, curator of birds at the St. Louis Zoo. "The Pekin duck is normally bred for its meat. They become very heavy and they don't have strong breast muscles therefore making it very difficult to fly. It is unusual to see one fly".

The ducks are also sold as pets, which Macek discourages. Celebrity Pekin ducks include Donald Duck and the Aflac duck.

Unlucky Pekin ducks are dumped in the park, usually shortly after Easter every vear when the fluffy chicks have grown too big and bothersome to take care of, Stader said last year a total of 22 were left in the park - 7 in Horseshoe Lake and 15 in Boathouse Lake.

"The problem," she said, "is that if the chicks are taken away from their mothers too soon they have not been taught to swim yet and because they can't fly either, they are vulnerable to predators such as dogs and raccoons. In addition, if they can't swim, they are unable to forage for food in the lake. The other ducks won't teach them how to swim so they can end up in danger and drown."

This is where the volunteers come

in. Once involved with the ducks herself, Stader was quickly joined by her friends and fellow Holly Hills residents Ken and Shirley Pfadenhaur and more recently sisters Dorothy Dick and Marion Bender.

The group has taken ducks home and taught them to swim in anything that holds water including bath tubs, kitchen sinks, and pools. Ken Pfadenhaur even built a pond in his backyard to accommodate the ducks. Occasionally, they would keep ducks in cages in their basements when the ducks got infections or injuries and had to stay out of the water.

"We would put baby socks on their feet to keep them from pulling the bandages off," Stader said.

After being rehabilitated, the ducks would be adopted out after the prospective "parents" passed an interview and proved that they had a pond or lake on their property and could provide night shelter.

The volunteers have also taken many ducks over the years to veterinarians after they had been injured by predators or aotten into trouble with fishing lines or hooks. In years past, the Pekin Duck Fund would pay for the veterinarian visits. That fund is now depleted and volunteers pay for the care out of their own pockets, Stader said. The Missouri Department of Conservation still calls on them to rescue ducks, said Dorene Olson, one of the two remaining volunteers in the original Pekin Duck Fund.

The Pfadenhaurs' health no longer allows them to help, so it's now up to just Stader, Dick and Bender to take turns feeding shelled corn to the Pekin ducks in Carondelet Park as often as twice a day during the winter. In the summer they don't have to feed them as much because the ducks can find enough to eat on their own. As the volunteers feed the ducks they walk around the lakes picking up fishing line, hooks and plastic bags which can all cause great harm to the ducks.

For people interested in feeding the

ducks, Stader said they are used to bread - preferably whole grain - which should be torn into small pieces. Large pieces or loaves of bread and bagels are not good for them because they don't have

Several years ago when she had knee problems Stader said, she was afraid to walk on the icy ground to feed the ducks so she would drive up near the lakes, honk twice and the ducks would waddle over to her car to get fed. "They are smart ducks" Stader said.

Stader, Dick and Bender have named a lot of the ducks in Carondelet Park over the vears.

"General Sherman" is the boss. There is Grandma, Ike, Paul and Pearl, and Bonnie and Clyde, and the now deceased Mamie, to name a few.

Stader suggests that anyone who sees ducks with injuries such as fishing line wrapped around them or predator bites call the Parks Department at 314-298-5300, If anyone has property and would like to adopt ducks they can contact Olson at 314-956-1310.


